WE ARE BROOKE

Brooke Pakistan is an affiliate of Brooke UK, which was founded in 1934 and works across 13 countries in Asia, Africa, Central America and the Middle East.

Brooke globally improved the welfare of more than 1.5 million working equine animals across the world and in turn helping more than seven million people in some of the world's poorest communities.

Operating since 1991, Brooke Pakistan is the largest animal welfare organization in Pakistan. We aim to improve the welfare of horses, donkeys and mules working in many poor communities throughout Pakistan.

THE NEED

Millions of Pakistanis are dependent upon their working equines in a variety of ways, and put them to work in some of the country's harshest and most deprived environments. When people rely on their animals for their own livelihoods and for the survival of their families and communities, they are left extremely vulnerable if their animals are unable to work. It is therefore essential that these animals receive the appropriate care and attention to ensure their lives are free from pain, disease and distress, so that they can remain healthy and productive.



EQUINE

The word "equine" comes from from the Latin word "equus", which means horse.

In veterinary terms Equine refers to biological family of horses, donkeys, and mules

EQUINE POPULATION IN PAKISTAN

As per 2024 Government of Pakistan Agriculture census there are 5.75 million equines in Pakistan.

WORKING LIVESTOCK'S VITAL ROLE IN SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT

An estimated 100 million working horses, donkeys and mules contribute to the livelihoods of many poor communities around the world, yet their contribution to sustainable development is largely overlooked. These animals are not reflected in the livestock policy around them, making them 'invisible livestock'.

Working livestock need to be included in sustainable development, agricultural and animal health related projects because of their contribution to the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), particularly 1, 2, 3, 5, 6, and 13.



LIVELIHOODS

Working livestock, such as horses, donkeys and mules, provide direct income to support people's livelihoods across a wide range of sectors including agriculture, construction, brick kilns, tourism, mining, and transport. In addition to their vital contribution to the household incomes of their owners and users, they also generate significant economic savings in the transportation of people or goods. In this way, they represent an important asset of the poor and help to keep those that benefit from their labour out of poverty, thereby contributing to SDG 1 (No Poverty).



FOOD SYSTEMS

Working livestock play a fundamental role in agriculture and food systems. They provide draught powered soil tillage and manure for fertiliser. Crucially, they transport feed and water for other livestock, such as cows, buffalos, chickens, sheep and goats, as well as food, water and firewood for households themselves. They are also used to transport sick livestock to animal health posts, helping people to access animal health services. Working horses and donkeys then transport agricultural and livestock produce to markets and milk cooperatives, providing a crucial linkage in the "first mile" of the value chain, between the point of production and all weather roads that can be easily accessed by other vehicles. Combined with the food-purchasing power provided by the income they generate, working livestock make a substantial contribution to meeting SDG 2 (Zero Hunger) and SDG 6 (Clean Water and Sanitation), by promoting enhanced food security and nutrition and sustainable agricultural development in low and middle income countries, as well as enabling communities to access water that would otherwise be out of reach.



ONE HEALTH

The health of humans, animals, and ecosystems are interlinked. Strong well-resourced animal health systems are pivotal to the realisation of several SDGs, including SDG 3 (Good Health and Wellbeing) and the implementation of One Health (an approach that aims to balance and optimise the health of people, animals and ecosystems). Through the Action for Animal Health coalition, Brooke calls for stronger animal health systems to operationalise One Health, and also to achieve several SDGs, including 1, 2 and 3.



WOMEN LIVESTOCK KEEPERS

Our research in Pakistan showed us that women prioritise the ownership and use of working animals as a strategy for income generation, relief from domestic burdens and increased status and recognition within their communities, often ranking them above their other animals due to their crucial role in livestock raising contributing to SDG 5 (Gender Equality).



RESILIENCE

Working livestock represent an important social protection mechanism, boosting community resilience in the face of disasters and climate. They enable communities to collect water or food from great distances, boost community resilience against climate change impacts like land degradation, and help families to relocate or rebuild homes and infrastructure when needed. The loss of a working animal can be detrimental to those who depend on it. For example, the reduction in household income and the need to pay for transport that was previously free, forces families to switch to less nutritious foods, leave young children unattended to collect water, wood or forage by foot, and take children out of school due to the prohibitive cost of fees, books, transport or uniforms. Overall, working livestock play a key role towards community resilience, contributing to SDGs 1, 2 and 6, as well as 13 (Climate Action).

WHERE WE WORK

Brooke Pakistan is working in **43** districts across Pakistan which are divided into 7 regions. Our community based equine welfare program includes service delivery, community development, advocacy, partnership, and applied research to ensure healthy working animals for the poorest communities.

Brooke Pakistan has worked in over **3,000** communities (2638 Brick kilns, 212 Coal mines, and 200 workplace communities) improving the health and welfare of 273,000 equids, benefiting 550,000 animal owners and users. Our Advocacy initiatives i.e. animal welfare laws, liaison with government livestock departments and academia ensured a positive impact in the lives of **1,150,000** animals indirectly.

As a learning organisation we put impact, continuous improvement and transformation, at the heart of what we do.

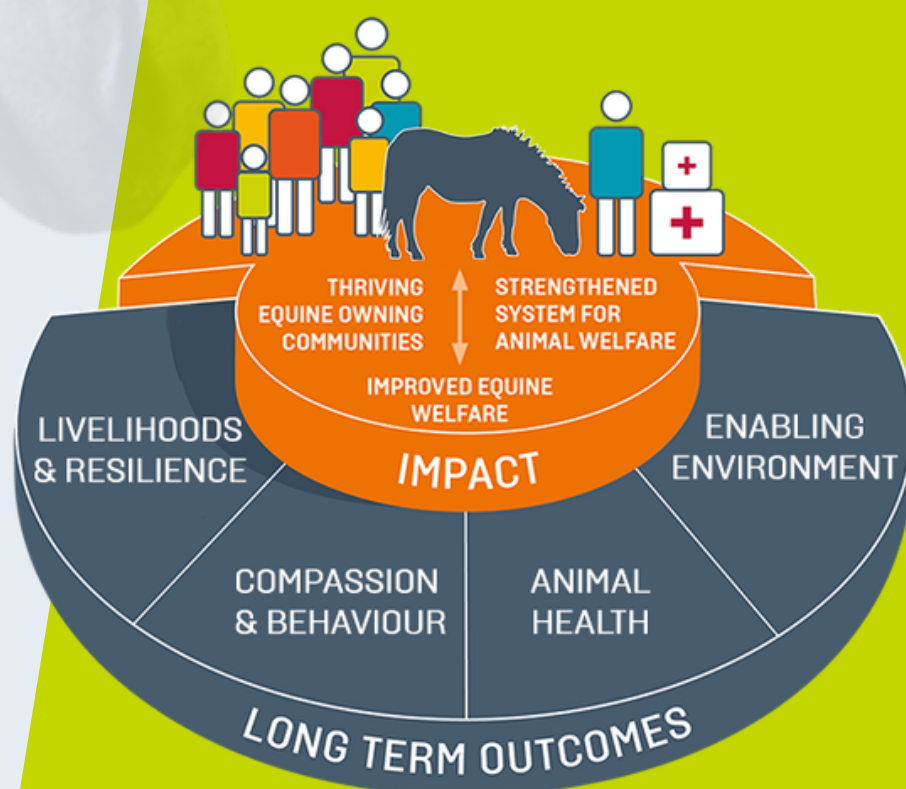

Decades of learning have shown us that lasting change comes from strengthening local capacity—building systems, skills, and knowledge that continue to benefit animals and people long after direct support ends. Sustainable impact requires transformation at every level: community attitudes, daily practices, service delivery systems, and the laws that govern animal welfare.

While we remain committed to responding to suffering and emergencies whenever needed, our primary focus is prevention. By investing in behaviour change, community ownership, and resilient animal health systems, we work to ensure that poor welfare situations are avoided before they occur.

This long-term, systems-oriented approach is what makes Brooke Pakistan's work effective, sustainable, and truly transformative.

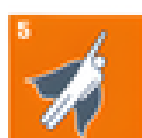

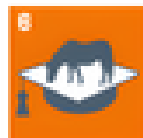

SUMMARY OF PROGRAMMATIC APPROACH:

Brooke Pakistan works through existing local animal health systems, strengthening them by improving skills, resources, and service delivery. While our primary focus is on building sustainable veterinary services, we continue to provide direct veterinary treatment in emergencies and life-threatening situations where immediate intervention is critical for animal welfare.

Human behaviour change is critical at all levels within a project to achieve transformational change for the equids and the communities that rely on them for their livelihood.

We work with owners, communities and policy influencers to bring about long lasting improvements in the care of working equids by using our specific technical knowledge to train, mentor and support those responsible for the animal welfare.

We advocate at all levels from local government to international organisations, to promote recognition of working equids as livestock and have them included in animal welfare policies, aspiring to reach the millions of working animals across the world that our direct programmes cannot access.

Direct reach are horses, donkeys and mules who receive direct support from Brooke Pakistan or its partner towards their welfare with regards to their health, nutrition or environment. It could include but is not limited to delivery of shelters, water points, emergency aid kits.

GOAL 1 – TRANSFORMING EQUINE WELFARE IN COMMUNITIES

In Pakistan, over 6 million working horses, donkeys, and mules play a vital role in supporting the livelihoods of thousands of families, both in rural, and urban communities. At Brooke Pakistan, we work with animal owning communities to promote compassionate and sustainable care for their animals. By improving equine welfare, we not only enhance the lives of these hardworking animals but also contribute to the wellbeing and resilience of the communities that depend on them.

Brooke Pakistan works to strengthen equine welfare by empowering communities, improving husbandry practices, and promoting compassionate, humane treatment of working horses, donkeys, and mules. Through a combination of direct outreach, partnerships, and behaviour-change initiatives, the programme engages thousands of equine-owning communities each year across brick kilns, agriculture, transport, and coalmines.

Community Engagement and Sustainable Change: Brooke Pakistan's Community Engagement and Welfare Teams (CEWTs) remain at the core of Goal 1, working with equine-owning families to improve daily care, strengthen knowledge, and encourage practical welfare friendly practices. Communities engaged through CEWTs, brick kiln associations, and targeted mining area interventions regularly demonstrate improvements in husbandry, reduced harmful practices, and better access to local resources. A phased exit process ensures that communities meeting agreed behavioural and welfare benchmarks can sustainably maintain progress without continued support.

Women and Child Engagement for Equine Welfare: Women and young people play a vital role in shaping long term welfare outcomes. Brooke Pakistan promotes inclusive participation through women's groups, children's groups, and community structures that encourage shared responsibility for animal care. Community Revolving Funds (CRFs), fodder hubs, and other collective initiatives help families mobilize local resources for cart repair, harness improvement, treatment support, shelter, and water access; strengthening both welfare and resilience. National and international recognition of Brooke Pakistan's female staff underscores the organisation's commitment to gender equity and leadership.

Compassionate Handling and Behaviour Change: Human behaviour change is central to improving equine welfare. Brooke Pakistan promotes compassionate handling through trainings, mentoring, motivational sessions, and creative awareness activities such as puppet shows and children's competitions. Field teams apply global best practice frameworks including positive reinforcement and the Least Intrusive, Minimally Aversive (LIMA) approach to encourage safer, kinder interactions with animals. Collaboration with academic institutions and participation in international communities of practice further strengthens technical capacity and sector wide learning.



Harnessing, Equipment, and Practical Solutions

Improving equipment and reducing injury risks is a major focus under Goal 1. Through participatory research, skill building, and community led innovations, Brooke Pakistan supports the adoption of safer harnesses, better saddlery, and welfare-friendly alternatives to injurious practices such as hobbling. Training on maintenance, rope head-collar making, and problem-solving helps communities become self-reliant and promotes long-lasting improvements in equine comfort and performance.

Evidence-Based Programming

A data driven approach guides all interventions. Tools such as the Equine Welfare and Owner Behaviour assessment enable teams to identify priority welfare issues, understand owner behaviour, and track progress over time. Insights from these assessments inform planning, resource allocation, and the design of targeted solutions that deliver meaningful, measurable change.

Supporting Livelihoods and Resilient Communities

Brooke Pakistan's livelihood-focused initiatives strengthen the ability of equine-owning families to care for their animals in challenging environments. Support resources such as water troughs, shade structures, first aid kits, and tree plantation, enhance animal comfort and reinforce sustainable welfare practices at community level.



GOAL 2 – INCREASING THE VISIBILITY AND INCLUSION OF WORKING EQUIDS

Brooke Pakistan advocates for a future where working horses, donkeys, and mules are fully recognised in policy, legislation, and national development agendas. By engaging government institutions, civil society, academia, and global partners, Brooke Pakistan works to ensure that the welfare needs of equines are visibly reflected in laws, systems, and public commitments.

Strengthening Policy and Legislative Frameworks

Brooke Pakistan plays a leading role in advancing animal welfare legislation at federal and provincial levels. The organisation actively engages policymakers to ensure that draft animal welfare bills, livestock policies, and national animal health frameworks formally recognise working equids as sentient beings and include enforceable welfare standards. Continued collaboration with livestock departments, parliamentary bodies, and regulatory institutions supports the development and future implementation of comprehensive legislation.

Government Partnerships and System-Level Engagement

Strategic engagement with government agencies aims to institutionalise equine welfare within existing structures. This includes advocating for the revision of formal agreements, strengthening local-level service delivery, and ensuring that animal welfare is incorporated into sectoral planning. Brooke Pakistan also works with mining, brick kiln, and workplace associations to promote the provision of welfare resources such as shelter, water, shade, and first aid as part of routine operational standards.

Integrating Equine Welfare into National Priorities

Brooke Pakistan champions the inclusion of working equids within Pakistan's broader development frameworks, including the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) and One Health agendas. Through policy dialogues, research inputs, and technical submissions, the organisation highlights how equines contribute to livelihoods, food security, labour, and community resilience. Brooke Pakistan's advocacy ensures that animal health and welfare remain visible in discussions on national planning, pandemic preparedness, and economic development.



Addressing Emerging Welfare Risks

The organisation maintains a proactive stance on emerging threats affecting equine welfare such as the donkey skin trade by conducting evidence based analysis, engaging policymakers, and advocating for protective legal measures. Multi level awareness efforts, civil society partnerships, and policy-focused interventions aim to safeguard millions of working donkeys from exploitation and unregulated slaughter.

Building Broad Coalitions and Public Awareness

Brooke Pakistan strengthens alliances with NGOs, academic institutions, SPCA bodies, youth organisations, and community structures to elevate understanding of animal welfare across society. Through seminars, campaigns, and collaborative events including university partnerships and national awareness days, the organisation fosters a supportive environment for systemic change. These collaborations amplify the message that working equids are essential contributors to livelihoods, transport, and economic activity.

Promoting Safe and Humane Work Environments

In mining, brick kiln, and transport sectors, Brooke Pakistan facilitates improvements in working environments for both equines and people. Partnerships with associations and industry bodies help drive practical measures that reduce injuries, dehydration, and preventable suffering. These efforts reinforce the shared responsibility between government, private sector, and communities in upholding welfare standards.



GOAL 3 – DEVELOPING SUSTAINABLE ANIMAL HEALTH SYSTEMS

Sustainable local healthcare systems are key to meet long term health and welfare needs of working horses, donkeys, and mules in Pakistan. Brooke Pakistan takes a broad and thoughtful approach that focuses on understanding the root causes of poor equine health and finding practical, long-lasting solutions. Our goal is to make sure animals get the right care at the right time, from well-trained and trusted local service providers

Building Capacity and Raising Professional Standards

A core priority is improving the knowledge, skills, and confidence of Animal Health Providers including government and private veterinarians, paravets, and farriers. Through structured training, mentoring, and continuous professional development, Brooke Pakistan works to ensure that service providers uphold high standards of clinical practice, preventive care, and humane handling. Regular monitoring and field based mentoring help reinforce quality, bridge competency gaps, and embed a culture of compassion within local animal health services.

Strengthening Farriery Systems

Recognizing the critical role of farriery in equine welfare, Brooke Pakistan invests in raising farriery standards across the country. This includes practical skills training, targeted mentoring, quality assessment, and the provision of improved tools and guidance. Collaboration with global farriery experts and regional partners enables the sharing of best practices and contributes to the development of quality, welfare friendly farriery services that are embedded within equine animal owning communities.

Supporting Resilience and One Health Preparedness

Brooke Pakistan promotes stronger, more inclusive animal health systems that are aligned with One Health principles and resilient to emerging threats. By contributing technical expertise, participating in national planning processes, and facilitating multi-stakeholder collaboration, the organisation underscores the role of working equids in community resilience, public health, and disease preparedness.



Enhancing Access to Essential Veterinary Medicines

Brooke Pakistan plays a leading role in improving access to essential veterinary medicines for animal owning communities. By strengthening linkages with veterinary medicine suppliers, supporting government departments, and promoting responsible antimicrobial use, the organisation advocates for consistent availability of key medicines. Brooke Pakistan contributes to national and international dialogue on essential veterinary medicine standards, supporting the integration of equids within broader veterinary health frameworks.

Integrating Animal Health and Welfare into Policy & Academia

The organisation works closely with national and provincial governments to ensure that animal health is recognised as a vital component of public health and development. Through collaboration with ministries, livestock departments, and sectoral partners, Brooke Pakistan advocates for the inclusion of equine welfare in policy planning, regulatory systems, and public investment priorities. Engagement with academic institutions and Veterinary Training Institutes supports curriculum development, faculty training, and student exposure to humane handling, euthanasia protocols, and evidence based health practices, preparing the next generation of veterinarians and paravets to deliver quality, ethical care.

Creating Community Embedded and Sustainable Health Solutions

Across all interventions, the emphasis remains on building systems that last, where trained local practitioners, accessible services, essential medicines, and improved farriery work together to deliver sustainable animal health solutions. Through this approach, Brooke Pakistan strengthens the foundations of long term welfare, ensuring that animal owning communities can rely on effective, humane, and sustainable care for their animals.



DISASTER RESPONSE, RELIEF, REBUILD

Pakistan faces recurring and increasingly severe floods that put both communities and their working equines at great risk. These disasters often leave families without shelter, income, or access to basic services, while animals suffer from injury, disease, and lack of food and water.

A Legacy of Action in Times of Crisis

Brooke Pakistan has consistently acted as one of the earliest responders during national emergencies

2005 Earthquake:

First major deployment of mobile veterinary relief teams provided 100,000 kg of supplies and emergency services for over 50,000 injured animals

2010 & 2011 Floods:

Large scale treatment, feed support, and mobile clinics

COVID-19 Pandemic:

Emergency feed support and essential veterinary services during lockdown

2022 & 2025 Floods:

Two phase relief and rehabilitation operation reaching 35,000 animals and 25,000 people



Disaster Response Leadership

Since its inception in 1991, Brooke Pakistan has been at the forefront of disaster response for equine owning communities across the country. Recognizing the vulnerability of working animals during crises, Brooke has developed rapid response mechanisms to deliver emergency veterinary care, feed, and water during floods, droughts, and other natural calamities. These interventions have ensured the survival of thousands of animals, safeguarding the livelihoods of families who depend on them.

Rehabilitation, and Recognition

Beyond immediate relief, Brooke Pakistan has consistently prioritized long-term rehabilitation. The organization works closely with affected communities to restore animal health and rebuild resilience through training in improved husbandry practices, farriery, and sustainable resource management. Brooke's efforts have earned national and international recognition: The President of Pakistan honored Brooke with a commendation certificate, and Brooke Trustees were invited to the Presidency to acknowledge their outstanding contribution in helping tens of thousands of animals critical to rebuilding livelihoods. Additionally, Her Royal Highness The Duchess of Cornwall visited Brooke Pakistan's flood relief camp accompanied by His Royal Highness The Prince of Wales. More recently, the Government of Sindh (for the 2022 floods) and the Government of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa (for the 2025 floods) formally acknowledged Brooke Pakistan's exceptional services in disaster relief and rehabilitation.



OUR PARTNERS

At Brooke Pakistan, collaboration lies at the heart of our mission to improve the welfare of working equines and the livelihoods of communities that depend on them. Our impact was made possible through strong and sustained partnerships that brought together grassroots action, technical expertise, and institutional support.

Funded Partners

Our core implementing partners continued to play a vital role in delivering high impact interventions on the ground. We worked closely with Sindh Rural Support Organization (SRSO), Sukaar Foundation, and Grass-Root Organization for Human Development (GODH).

These organizations helped us reach equine-owning communities across some of the most challenging geographies in Pakistan. Their deep local knowledge and community mobilization skills were instrumental in implementing welfare focused interventions and ensuring ownership at the grassroots level.

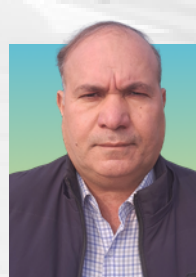

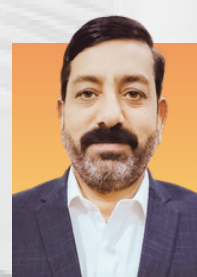
